THOUGHTS FOR MARCH

March is a funny month, to use a phrase "tis neither fish nor fowl". Calm sunny days give glimpses of Spring that lead to frosty nights keeping us in the memory of winter. The bulbs begin to struggle through only to be battered by the storm force winds associated with the Spring Equinox. The grass needs cutting but its too wet for the mower and before you realise it you've missed the first opportunity to plant your early spuds. I'll just have to have another coffee and think about it some more.

There are times when faced with writing an article you seem to spend more time thinking than writing, but during this Winter Olympic time in the background seems to run a constant theme of the question of how we speak and relate to each other. A frequent phrase heard from the younger element of our society is "you'se dissing me." Disrespect comes in many forms and the latest form is the abuse of a position of power to force those who are less sure of themselves and their relationship to others in the organisation they work, to do things that do not form part of that working partnership, or go beyond the normal boundaries of accepted moral behaviour.

What's the answer? I suppose if I knew that there would be a good chance I would be The First Lord of the Treasury. Can I make the case for just starting by saying "Good morning" to each other and not just the people you know. When you get to know people a little better it is surprising to find out how much we all share as common values, the differences between us manifests itself in how we all strive to achieve these aims and goals. The next time you pop into the church of "Dikes" see how many of us spend time talking and acknowledging one another. Simple stuff like "Have you seen so and so lately?" "How's your family?"; your starter for 10 could even be about the weather.

If we are all prepared to share a little of ourselves with each other then we would be more prepared to share and question if we come across a situation we think is not quite right. You never know it may the start of a more caring, equitable, open society that will benefit us all.

Thursdays in Lent in Spire Hill



The service of Night Prayer will be held at 7.00pm held on Monday in Purse Caundle; Tuesday in Stourton Caundle Church; Wednesday in King's Stag Memorial Chapel.

On Maundy Thursday, 29th March, clergy, licensed lay ministers, eucharistic assistants, organists and many others from across the Diocese of Salisbury gather at Salisbury Cathedral at I Iam for the Chrism Eucharist which includes the re -affirmation of ministerial vows.



Good Friday, 30th March, begins with Morning Prayer at Purse Caundle Church at 9.00am. The Walk of Witness starts at Stalbridge Church at 10.00am. A large wooden cross is carried through the town to The Ring for a short act of worship at about 10.20am. The cross is then carried along public footpaths to Stourton Caundle Church for Midday Prayer at 12.30pm. At about 1.00pm, the cross is carried on to Stock Gaylard Church for Evening Prayer at 2.00pm. You will be welcome to join any part of this day of pilgrimage and prayer. Those walking, please wear suitable footwear and clothing.



There is morning worship at 11.00am on 4th March in the Memorial Chapel. Jesus goes to Jerusalem for the Passover, and causes uproar when he attacks the lawful business



going on in the Temple. His words and actions suggest that, through his cross, he will replace the Temple. How do you decide if an action is wise or foolish?

On 18th March at 11am in the Memorial Chapel, there is a service of Holy Communion with hymns. Some Greeks wish to see Jesus – a reminder that Jesus is for all people. Seeing what lies ahead, Jesus is unsettled; but when God speaks, Jesus says that the voice is for his disciples' benefit, not his. How do you think people hear God's voice today?





In St Barnabas Church, Stock Gaylard on 25th March at 8.00am, we start our journey through Holy Week with a special service for Palm Sunday. Jesus enters Jerusalem on a donkey. A woman anoints Jesus' feet during a meal. The following evening, Jesus eats his last supper, is betrayed and arrested. By the next afternoon, after a mock trial, he has been put to death on a cross.

The Speaker for the evening was Nicky Fidgin who enlightened us about "Labyrinth, Pathways to peace in a stressful life".

Nicky had helped at a centre for young mums and their little ones. One Monday morning she noticed one of the mums was missing, subsequently hearing that the child had died. Nicky and another helper called on the family and she agreed to sing at the funeral which she worried about a lot. Nicky had agreed to go on holiday with a friend to help look after her mother. They went to the Scilly Isles and whilst out walking came across a labyrinth, following the stone pathway which lead into the centre of the labyrinth. She stayed for a while thinking about the forthcoming funeral and it helped to calm her mind. On returning home she opened a book and found exactly the right song to sing and felt that walking the labyrinth had helped her considerably. Walking the path to the centre of a labyrinth represents life's journey, it helps to clear the mind, a form of walking meditation.

Labyrinths are mostly Catical in design, one can be seen at Tintagel, also Seaton Gardens and in the Scilly Isles, one of a Medieval design can be seen in the Chartreuse Cathedral in France. There is also one of the eight remaining on

the Village Green at Hilton in Cambridge. There are other shapes and designs such as the Miz-Maze at Breamore.

Nicky sometimes takes a portable Labyrinth to Junior Schools around the area which the children enjoy and seem to gain some benefit from using the labyrinth. I think we all benefited from her talk, although I had heard of them I did not know anything about them but found it very interesting.

The competition for "Flower of the Month" was won by Karen Robinson, 2nd Wendy Bailey 3rd June Harman and "An unusual stone or pebble" Ist was Frances Ryall, 2nd Me (Yeay!), with all others having equal votes.







February Meeting

Geoff Jeans our Vice Chairman welcomed us all to the January meeting, he told us how our chairman Brian was doing, and we all signed a get well card for him.

Geoff asked for nominations to chair the Society at the AGM in March as the whole committee will be stand-

ing down. Some members will be standing for re-election, others wish to come off, as they have been on the committee for a good number of years.

Tony Moore gave out announcements, and welcomed this evening's speaker, being Judith Stewart, this talk was entitled "Bach Flower Remedies".

Judith explained all about the history of the "Bach Company". How Mr Bach was born in the 1880s, and studied to become a doctor and surgeon, whilst he understood conventional medicine, he also wanted to discover, the herbal possibilities. After finishing his studies at Birmingham university, qualifying as a doctor, on his time off he began walking the fields and hills in Wales collecting wild herbs, plants and flowers, but only when the sun shone as it was very important to catch the natural dew.

At his home in Brightwell he set about preserving his collections in spring water and brandy thus creating the natural remedies that we can still buy today. In all he kept finding new remedies up until two months before he died, in total 38 remedies were produced, helping people and pets, with all manner of problems, such as agoraphobia, fear of heights, flying, panic attacks, healing after operations, stress and low self-esteem. The bacteriology found in these remedies, to date works well alongside conventional medicine.

Judith has also trained in massage and reiki healing and along with other volunteers she gives her time to places like St Margaret's Hospice.

This was an inspiring talk and we all learnt much more about the little yellow bottle of "rescue remedy" that I'm sure we all have in our cupboard, if not we need to purchase a bottle to use on those tricky days that we all have!

Next month is our A.G.M. so if you think that you would like to join the committee you are most welcome. This is also the "Spring Show" so if you have any daffodils or spring bulbs in bloom please do bring them along, they will make a lovely show. The date, Thursday 8th March. Time, 7.30pm. Scripture Reading

Read the Bible passage and notes from New Daylight (The Bible Reading Fellowship), or other notes, or one of passages below.

Sunday (*Hebrews 2.10-12*)

It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, saying, 'I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you.'

Monday (Mark 8.31-35)

Jesus began to teach his disciples that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.'

Tuesday (Isaiah 53.4-6)

Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases; yet we ac-

counted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

Wednesday (1 Corinthians 1.18,22-25)

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Thursday (1 Peter 2.24,25)

Christ himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

Friday (Romans 5.6-8)

While we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person – though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us.

Saturday (John 12.23-26)

Jesus answered Andrew and Philip, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour.'

Response A time of Silence for reflection, ending with Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
