

SEASONS SCRIBBLINGS

The call of the open page shouts at me as it's my turn to find the appropriate words to reflect on for this time of year.

It is a time of expectant excitement of the child in all of us as we wonder what the magic day will reveal; the commercial outlets hope they have their stock levels correct with not too much to sell at discount prices in the new year; in the Christian church communities across the lands they are celebrating the season of Advent, the period of time when the prophesies of the Old Testament are remembered as they foretold the of the coming of a Messiah who would rescue their people.

We have the advantage of history because we know that when Isaiah spoke about "the voice that cried out in the wilderness" it came to be proved correct. The Messiah was born but did the society of the time realise this fact had taken place. That story would take some thirty-three years to unfold. I often wonder if Jesus was born into our society today would we recognise the fact and realise its importance.

The period of waiting and longing also has a particular significance for the Spire Hill Benefice as we look forward to being able to welcome a new Rector to help us in the benefice. No doubt the rumour mill has run its course and you will have heard that as I write there have been no applicants for the position. This is not unusual these days; Martock have advertised their vacancy four times, the Golden Cap Benefice had a Rector transferred to them from Devon, it would seem that the numbers required for ordination to fill the positions are not requesting to be trained as they once were. The diocese will support us during this time, but it does mean that the same amount of work has to be undertaken by a diminishing group of people both ordained and lay members of the church family.

This vacancy is also an opportunity to reflect on what sort of church do we want or need to be here in rural North Dorset. Are we an organisation whose purpose is to keep an increasingly expensive, listed building available for occasional use by the community, or a group that is looking to support and sustain our local peoples, that is a vibrant, welcoming, caring organisation? I'd be interested in your thoughts and not just from those who attend services on a very regular basis.

Still we have another year to look forward to with all the anticipation and hope that the turning of the year brings about. A happy and peaceful New Year to you all. Ed




