READING CHALLENGE 2016



To get you in the mood do take at look at the following:

The new unique Roald Dahl Dictionary

from Oxford Dictionaries is not an ordinary dictionary. After all, you wouldn't expect an 'Oxford Roald Dahl Dictionary' to be ordinary, would you? Lots of dictionaries tell you what an 'alligator' is, or how to spell 'balloon'

From Millennium to Symphony

The next few weeks in the Library will see changes to the way books are taken out and returned. Dorset is joining with six other Library Authorities in the South West to become part of 'Libraries West'.

This means patrons will be able to choose books from 150 libraries, with over 2million books and stretching from the Bristol Channel to Poole Harbour. This does mean that procedures may be slightly disrupted whilst the computer changeover takes place.

Do not worry, all our volunteers are fully aware and will help you through the process in the coming weeks and please be patient with them, and those working in every Dorset Library, because things can change on a daily or even hourly basis. However we hope you will be pleased with the system and greater choice of books. Please take a leaflet from the Library, which explains this in greater depth. The new system goes live on 7th June.

Man Booker International Prize 2016

The Vegetarian by Han Kang is this year's winner. Yeong-hye and her husband are ordinary people. He is an

office worker with moderate ambitions and mild manners; she is an uninspired but dutiful wife. The acceptable flatline of their marriage is interrupted when Yeonghye, seeking a more 'plant-like' existence, decides to become a vegetarian, prompted by grotesque recurring nightmares. Fraught, disturbing and beautiful, The Vegetarian is a novel about modern day South Korea, but also a novel about shame, desire and our faltering attempts



to understand others, from one imprisoned body to another.

All the words that Roald Dahl invented are here, like 'biffsquiggled' and 'whizzpopping' to remind you what means what, but that is not all

You'll also find out where words came from, rhyming words, synonyms and lots of alternative words for words that are overused. Oxford Children's Dictionaries are perfect for supporting literacy and learning and this is the world's first Roald Dahl Dictionary from the word experts at Oxford University Press. Spring into e-books!



Top 3 Fiction


1. The Last Mile by David Baldacci. Convicted murderer Melvin Mars is counting down the last hours before his execution--for the violent killing of his parents twenty years earlier--when he's granted an unexpected reprieve. Another man has confessed to the crime. The confession has the potential to make Melvin Mars--guilty or not--a free man. Who wants Mars out of prison? And why now? Extraor-dinary detective Amos Decker will



need all of his extraordinary brainpower to stop an innocent man from being executed.

2. Private Paris by James Patterson

When Jack Morgan stops by Private's Paris office, he is quickly pressed into duty after getting a call from his client Sherman Wilkerson, asking Jack to track down his young granddaughter, who is on the run from a brutal drug dealer. Before Jack can locate her, several members of France's cultural elite are found dead-murdered in stunning, symbolic fashion. Only Jack and his Private team can connect the dots before the smoldering powder keg explodes.



3. *Orphan X* by Greg Hurwitz.
